Vietnam is such a beautiful country and it's unfortunate that America was sucked into a war that should never happened. It's a tragedy that is still debated to this day. Despite being one of the most controversial wars in our history, our Vietnam veterans, such as Colonel Ken Cordier, fought gallantly for our country. They are the reason why I am here in America, enjoying the greatest freedom given to all individuals who are lucky to be called Americans. I, along with my family and the Vietnamese community here in America will forever be grateful and indebted to Colonel Ken Cordier and all our Vietnam veterans. I salute Colonel Ken Cordier and may you Rest in Peace in the Kingdom of God. "It is better to serve than to be served."



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NATIONAL & HOMELAND SECURITY REPORT

THE NEW RUSSIA, CHINA, IRAN, AND NORTH KOREAN ALLIANCE

The new Russia, China, Iran, and North Korean (DPRK) alliance affects US national security, because the alliance between these countries competes with the US and its allies with their combined petroleum energy reserves, technical abilities, military strength, and geographical size. Each of these countries oppose US freedoms, its economic policies, and military might, but together, they could unite to oppose the US-controlled world order.

Last week Vladimir Putin visited North Korea for the first time in 24 years. Putin and Kim Jong-un signed a defense pact to come to the aid of each other's country if either were facing aggression. DPRK agreed to supply ammunition, three million artillery shells, and short-range missiles to Russia for their war against Ukraine. Russia will supply North Korea missile, satellite, space, and nuclear technology. Last March, Putin said that Russian and Chinese "national interests coincide." Russia and China are trying to integrate the Chinese BeiDou satellite navigation system with the Russian GLONASS satellite system to compete with the US Global Positioning System. Iran already has full access to the Chinese satellite system. Iran, Russia, and China recently conducted joint naval exercises in the Arabian Sea. If Iran develops nuclear weapons, it will be able to reach every Middle Eastern country, including Israel with its ballistic missiles. Iran's proxies – Hezbollah, Hamas, and the Houthi rebels of Yemen do most of the fighting against Israel, but Europe and the US are not out of its terrorist aspirations.

A nightmare scenario could occur if Russia and Iran coordinated an attack to disrupt sea traffic on multiple oceans. This would disrupt sea lanes and severely curtail oil, gas supplies, and supply chains, as 80-90 percent of the world's goods are transported by sea. A joint attack against Israel, Saudi Arabia, other Gulf states, or Eastern Europe, could involve the US in the largest war since WWII. Other possibilities include China attacking Taiwan, or the North Koreans invading South Korea. Another scenario would be if the DPRK exploded a nuclear bomb in orbit over the US to create an Electromagnetic Pulse (EMP). An EMP would "fry" the computer electronics of modern computers – in planes, cars, trucks; electrical grids; stock markets; and banking systems. Our modern society would revert to a survival existence like the late 1800s. It is likely our freedoms and democracy would be lost. If the US was able to endure, it might have to fight on multiple continents and oceans to survive or defend its allies. It is no secret that Russia and China oppose the US-controlled world order as it now exists, and these countries have a history of exploiting weakness and indecision.

Russia, China, Iran, and North Korea are pariah states, and they form a formidable alliance against the US and its allies with their combined military and political power. Russia wants to reclaim territory lost after the Cold War and reinstate Union of Soviet Socialist Republics boundaries. Iran wants to dominate the Middle East with nuclear weapons. North Korea wants to defeat South Korea and control the Korean peninsula. China desires to become the geopolitical, military, and economic superpower of the world. Many intelligence analysts and policy makers are alarmed about these developments and agree that most of these problems are self-imposed by poor policies and decision-making by the US government. DOD, State Department, along with the White House deserve special criticism for the poor planning. The inadequate planning and execution of the Afghanistan withdrawal debacle led to a series of miscues, policy retrenchments, and poor decisions. The US must strengthen its economy and currency by reducing its \$35 Trillion (T) debt and \$1.6T deficit, by dramatically cutting wasteful spending. It should also control and protect its borders, restore its military, refill the depleted Strategic Petroleum Reserve, support its allies, and deter its enemies. Strong US leadership is needed to

J.R. Seeger

Rod Smith was an enlisted artilleryman with the First Marine Division in Vietnam. He spent eleven years as a federal prosecutor and joined the CIA in 1986. His last position was Chief of Special Activities Division, which provides trained paramilitary forces for operations around the world

J.R. Seeger has been an archeologist, a paratrooper, and a CIA case officer. He led Alpha Team, one of the first CIA teams into Afghanistan in the fall of 2001. JR is the author of the Mike 4 novel series, based on his experiences.

Rod and J.R. will discuss CIA paramilitary authorities and operations, how CIA's paramilitary forces are organized, and how CIA and the U.S. military worked together in post-9/11 Afghanistan to attack the Taliban and Al-Qaeda.

Past Commander Col. Cordier (Dallas Chapter MOWW) completed his final mission with us on June 18, 2024.

He was a well-known Vietnam veteran having survived over six years as a Prisoner of War in North Vietnam prison camps. He remained on active duty and retired after a distinguished career. He is survived by his wife Barbie Cordier. Barbie and he attended the chapter's Installation Banquet on June 4, 2024.

On Friday July 12 at 1100 hours his burial service will be at DFW National Cemetery. Enter the cemetery at the main entrance off 2000 Mountain Creek Parkway (Tejas Blvd to Lone Star Circle). Autos may be lined up no later than 1045 in lane 1. You will be directed to the shelter in which the service will be held. Be aware there is very limited seating in the shelter.

Immediately after this service at Dallas Baptist University (entered back further off Mountain Creek Parkway) there will be a light lunch served in the Janette Sadler Room, which is located on the ground floor of the campus Pilgrim Chapel. All, who attend the burial service, are most cordially invited to be Barbie Cordier's guests.

On Saturday, July 13 1400-1600 hours, there will be a Celebration of Life program at Frontiers of Flight Museum 6911 Lemmon Ave Dallas second floor auditorium.

On April 19, 1951 General Douglas MacArthur, the former Supreme Commander Allied Powers in Japan during the Korean War, gave his Farewell Address to a joint session of the U. S. Congress. One of the iconic lines of that speech has resonated with me ever since. He declared, "Old soldiers never die, they just fade away."



This has reminded me recently that the Dallas Chapter MOWW has an "Old Soldier," LTC Don Munson, U.S. Army Retired (on the right), who has served his chapter for more than two decades. He is by all measures still robust and active and far from expiring, but, over the past few months, replacements for his myriads of responsibilities have been located. His past responsibilities have included Chapter Newsletter Editor, Youth Leadership Conferences coordinator, Patriotic Education Chair, Information and Publicity Outreach chair, Wreaths Across America coordinator and Girl Scout recognition coordinator. He has received every conceivable award and recognition permissible for a local chapter to bestow. He has bequeathed to the Dallas Chapter MOWW distinguished and continuous service for over two decades. LTC Munson has served at every level of the Dallas Chapter, including commander, as well as serving on the regional and national levels as well as General Staff Officer to the National Commander-in-Chief. His contributions to the chapter have left a legacy that will endure far into the pages of our chapter's history. Every Dallas Chapter Commander since 2008 has had the benefit of his wisdom and counsel, as he has served the Chapter as the Special Operations Advisor and Historian. However, his positive contributions go far beyond the confines of his chapter as there is not a single MOWW program that has not benefitted from his enthusiasm, effort and encouragement in his devotion to veterans, a Youth Leadership Conference directorship, ROTC and JROTC students, Scouting awards and Law Enforcement. His last chapter award was the chapter "Above and Beyond" Award. When a person has received every conceivable award, how may another appropriate recognition be bestowed?

The Dallas Chapter considered a statuette or paid trip to a sunny Caribbean Island. In the end the chapter commissioned a portrait by the premier and noted North Texas military portrait artist, former Air Force Sergeant Colin Kimball. The presentation was made at the June 4, 2024 Dallas Chapter annual officer installation banquet.

Beginning his career as a Distinguished Military Graduate from Tulane University, he went on to serve in steadily progressing levels of responsibility. LTC Munson has an incredibly distinguished active duty as well as retired service in a myriad of arenas. He is qualified as a Master Parachutist, Army Ranger, Pathfinder, Jumpmaster and Jungle Warfare Expert. He is authorized to wear the Parachutist badges from the armies of Germany, Belgium, Vietnam and Thailand. His wartime service in the First Battalion, 7th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division in Vietnam resulted in several decorations of valor that include the Silver Star for Gallantry in Action, Distinguished Flying Cross, two Bronze Stars with V device, eleven Air Medals and a Purple Heart. As a Department of Defense contractor, he served post-military positions as Advisors to the Crown Prince, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia; to the Minister of Defense, Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina: to the Emirate of Kuwait; and to Ambassador Paul Bremer, interim President of the Republic of Iraq.

With his vigor, vitality and enthusiasm, we expect him to be around to advise several more chapter commanders. He is an "Old Soldier" who will never even "fade away" for his fellow Companions in the Dallas Chapter MOWW!

CPT Allen Clark, Past Chapter Commander
