The first untethered hot air balloon lifted off in 1783 followed by the first woman to fly it in the next year. Aviation itself, flying an airplane does not necessarily discriminate with the pilot at the controls.

The first woman to receive her pilot's license was Raymonde de Laroche in 1911 just 8 years after the Wright Brothers proved sustained flight was possible.

While women have always been involved with aviation, it took several decades before they were allowed by law to fly anything in the military inventory. In recent history, women now fly and serve in all aircraft in military service.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE IS CHANGING WARFARE AND THE US ECONOMY



Artificial Intelligence (AI) is a transformational force for America's economy and is altering the way we live and how the US military conducts warfare presently and in the future. All is machine technology that involves the theory and computer systems which perform tasks normally required by humans. It makes high speed complex decision-making computations, but also may involve visual, speech, and language discernment. All imitates human intelligence and performs tasks faster and sometimes solves problems based on information it gathers. By analyzing enormous amounts of data, it reduces response times for cybersecurity, business, and defense applications. All is changing drone technology, robotics, stealth technology, telecommunications, and cyber security so rapidly it is changing modern warfare. It requires copious amounts of electricity and energy to power the computers, and the data it collects, processes, and stores in increasingly larger data farms.

China, Russia, Iran, and North Korea are some of the state actors engaging in a race to improve and increase their AI capabilities. Each of these state actors is developing AI to attack or harm US – computer systems, power plants, pipelines, ships, troops, cities, and ports. China has used AI to attack US telecommunications, and Russia has interfered with our elections. Both US and Chinese military officials have voiced apprehension that increased use of AI systems could lead to accidental unintended conflicts increasing the risks of escalation. China recently developed unmanned military drones which can launch missiles without human control. These military drones include a stealth battle drone and an unmanned drone bomber. China's latest military drone is the Wing Loong I-D. It is armed with a BA-7 laser-guided missile. This air to surface missile is believed to be one of the world's most powerful anti-tank missiles. Military officials believe that these drones, and drones which have not yet been developed, could lead to an AI race to further develop drone warfare and may increase the likelihood of military conflict, or unintentional war. The Chinese may have also developed two sixth-generation stealth fighters which likely contain AI technology. Russia has increased attacks on Ukraine's energy sources using drones, and Ukrainian drones recently penetrated Russian airspace in Moscow. Drones allow smaller states, criminal syndicates, and terrorists to attack, surveil, and reconnoiter larger states, borders, and militaries using relatively low-cost drones, or drone swarms to overpower defensive technologies.

Al advancement is rapidly changing the world we live in, but it has risks to society if it is not controlled. It is altering the way we pay our bills, shop, and how we go to war. The world needs guardrails in the development of Al technology without sacrificing innovation. Al technology is increasing so rapidly that defensive warfare may not be able to keep up with Al threats. Representative governments must counter the nefarious actions of authoritarian governments like Russia, China, Iran, and North Korea by controlling Al development. US universities, technology, and defense firms need to redouble their efforts to safeguard the security of this technology and prevent adversaries – state actors, criminal syndicates, or radical Islamist terrorists, from having access to it. US national security depends upon the US and its allies making certain that American technology stays in US hands. To maintain its position as the foremost economic superpower, the US must preserve its telecommunications security and dominant Al leadership position. The future of US and global security may be determined by the decisions leaders make to ensure the development of Al and preventing bad actors access to it.


