

NATIONAL & HOMELAND SECURITY REPORT

ACQUIRING GREENLAND MAY BE IN THE US NATIONAL SECURITY INTEREST By: LtCol Michael W. Menefee, USMCR (Ret)

Greenland is a self-ruling territory of the Kingdom of Denmark and is the world's largest island. It is part of the North American tectonic plate and has global strategic importance because it borders both the Artic Ocean and the Atlantic Ocean. Most of Greenland is within the Artic Circle and is covered in a thick layer of ice up to 10,000 feet with an average depth of 5,000 feet. It has a 27,000-mile coastline which is difficult to monitor or defend. Greenland is the most sparsely populated country in the world with less than 60,000 inhabitants. It has 17 towns with no roads connecting them, and only one commercial airport. Commercial fishing is the primary industry of Greenland. Recently, President Trump has made statements saying the US would like to buy Greenland from Denmark; however, President Andrew Johnson was the first president who discussed acquiring Greenland in 1867. President Taft also tried to buy Greenland in 1910, and President Truman made another offer to purchase Greenland in 1946. President Eisenhower made another offer to buy Greenland in 1955, as did President Trump in 2019.

The US defensively seized and fortified Greenland with Danish permission after Germany invaded Denmark in WWII and has remained in Greenland since. In 1949, Denmark, Greenland, and the US became part of the NATO alliance. The US began to play a greater part of Greenland's defense in the Cold War. In 1943 the US developed Thule Air Base in northwestern Greenland, which was renamed Pituffik Space Base in 2023. Pituffik Space Base is the most northern US base and deep-water port. It is home to a ballistic missile early warning system for North America, space surveillance, space control sensors, and global satellite control network. Greenland became part of NORAD in 1959. Thule was one of the 50 other American bases which performed duties such as tracking Soviet submarines in the Greenland, Iceland, United Kingdom gap (GIUK gap). Pituffik Space Base is also used in lunar research and engineering. Pituffik can only receive heavy supplies by ship in the summer thaw.

The US believes it is vital for it to control Greenland because of its strategic location, space security, the GIUK Gap, its vast mineral deposits, access to the Artic Ocean, and the Artic polar ice cap. Denmark cannot defend Greenland and Greenland has no military or defense forces. Russia and China would like access to Greenland's enormous oil and natural gas deposits, rare earth metals, gold, graphite, iron ore, lithium, and uranium. The EU gets 100% of its rare earth metals from Chinese production, while the US gets about 72% of its rare earth metals from Chinese mining production. Rare earth metals are used to manufacture AI, aircraft, computer chips, space, and technology. China has proposed a polar silk road, a Northern Sea Route could become an alternative to the Suez Canal making the Artic polar region one of the most strategic maritime areas of the world and vitally important to US trade and military interests. China launched a satellite in 2022 to monitor and track Artic shipping routes and considers itself to be a "near-Artic state."

The US and China are in a strategic race to dominate the world militarily and economically. Russia is aligned with China, and Greenland is in the center of the shortest route between the US and Europe. This is especially critical if the polar ice melts, making the distance between Russia and the US and Canada shorter. To achieve strategic dominance, a country must control strategic waterways, air, space, and technology. They must have access to rare earth metals, and the ability to mine them. China is increasing investments in Greenland and the Artic region. Russia already patrols the Artic Ocean with some of its 40 icebreakers and has 65 submarines compared to 64 US submarines and two icebreakers. China has two icebreakers and 61 submarines. Both USCG icebreakers are currently undergoing repairs. Since Russia and China have ambitions to dominate the Artic Ocean and lay claim to Artic islands for mining and fishing rights, buying Greenland may be in the best US national security interests.

Prayer, Science, and Rowan's Gift



My son, Rowan Collier, was born with Biliary Atresia, a rare and deadly liver disease. At just 13 months old, Rowan received a life-saving liver transplant at UPMC Children's Starzl Transplant Center in Pittsburgh on 4 October 2019. Rowan is now 6 years old, in the first grade, playing soccer, and thriving under the excellent care of his post-transplant team led by Dr. Jorge Bezerra, Chairman and Chief of Pediatrics at UT Southwestern/ Dallas Children's.

Rowan's gift highlights the power of communities of prayer, the advancements of medical science, and the burden of genius like the late Dr. Thomas Starzl, the pioneering surgeon known as the Father of Organ Transplantation. Starzl served in the Navy after high school during WWII. After medical school and residencies, Starzl did the first liver transplants in the 1960s in Denver and later founded the liver transplant center in Pittsburgh in 1981. Each piece of this extraordinary puzzle would later play a crucial role in Rowan's diagnosis, surgery, recovery and continued health.

Organ donation made saving Rowan's life possible, and perhaps the life of someone you may know. In any given year in the United States there are 100,000 men, women and children on the organ transplant list, of which only 40,000 receive a life-saving gift. In a country with 335 million people, we must do better. Whether as a living donor, or after your life's last breath, it's a profound act of service and compassion that saves lives, akin to the MOWW moto, "It is nobler to serve than to be served."

It's an honor to serve as your Chaplain, and as a fellow companion, I encourage everyone to consider becoming an organ donor. Together, through prayer, science, and giving, we can offer not only hope and healing, but life to those in need.
