

NATIONAL & HOMELAND SECURITY REPORT

THE DEPARTMENT OF GOVERNMENT EFFICIENCY IS A NATIONAL SECURITY IMPERATIVE

The Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE) is the government organization undertaking the first federal budget audit since WWII. The controversial department is saving US taxpayers today billions of dollars by using Artificial Intelligence and updated software. Al sorts through millions of lines of budget code and has found the administrative state misspent billions of dollars funding political slush fund projects. Data says that 92% of the administrative state (full-time government employees) are registered Democrats. Effectively, lawmakers have delegated many of the legislative branch duties to full-time government employees. The Supreme Court recently overturned the ability of the administrative state to write laws, levy fees or fines. Many of the projects intended for US citizens instead funded affirmative action, abnormal behaviors, animal studies, DEI, CRT, and other agendas not supported by most Americans. A substantial amount of corrupt money, fraud, and waste was funneled to nongovernmental organizations to fund illegal migrant housing, food, clothing, medical care, airfare, cell phones, credit cards, and education. Other funds were spent on wasteful climate and green energy initiatives in the US, and non-friendly countries. DOGE employees using AI and computer software are uncovering billions of dollars of corruption, fraud, and waste in DOD, Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid. Over \$1T taxpayer funds were stolen during COVID. Tens of thousands of government bureaucrats have been laid off starting with those who do not show up to work. Dozens of empty government office buildings in Washington, DC will be repurposed. They are currently empty, as many government workers "work remotely." The goal of DOGE is to modernize federal agency computers, technology, and software. A secondary goal is to reduce corruption, waste, and fraud. Cabinet secretaries approve all DOGE layoffs.

Elon Musk, a multi-billionaire and one of the wealthiest men in the world, is leading the DOGE effort. He is the creative, serial business entrepreneur who founded the Boring Company (a tunnel transportation company), SpaceX, and Tesla. He co-founded OpenAl (an artificial intelligence company) and Neuralink (a brain-computer interface company). Musk also bought Twitter which he renamed X. Elon Musk was born in South Africa and legally immigrated to the US where he earned two bachelor's degrees (physics and economics) from the University of Pennsylvania. He has hired multiple CEOs, dozens of young programmers, computer scientists, and accountants to sift through hundreds of thousands of lines of budget coding, which little attention had been paid to in earlier administrations. Each DOGE hire is a federal contractor or employee. Those working with classified budgets and data have clearances. Musk is a Senior Advisor to President Trump and like President Trump is also working without a paycheck.

DOGE may save the national treasury a trillion (T) dollars of taxpayer money. Today, the US debt is approaching \$37T and the interest on the debt is greater than the DOD budget. Without drastic measures, government benefits such as Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and Veterans benefits may have to be reduced within two years. DOGE found the previous administration used funds from the VA to fund luxury hotel accommodations for illegal aliens and used FEMA funds for illegals instead of giving disaster relief to American citizens (for floods, hurricanes, tornados, fires, and earthquakes). Social Security has 20,000,000 people over age 100 on its rolls. The SBA gave infants millions of dollars in loans. DOGE cuts will streamline Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, and save over \$8B in DOD waste. Its technology will help reduce corruption, waste, and fraud, from all federal bureaucracies and departments. DOGE cuts are a national security imperative and will strengthen the dollar and economy.

In Memoriam

Dallas Chapter Companion Thomas Max Nygaard passed away into the loving arms of his savior, Jesus Christ, while holding his wife's hand, at the age of 90. Max will be deeply missed by his family, friends, and many acquaintances. His balanced nature was such that he was equally comfortable talking to a roughneck on a drilling rig or the President of the United States. His quick wit, loyalty, and tremendous sense of optimism brought joy to all he knew.

Max was born on September 27th, 1934, in Haynesville, Louisiana to Lois Marie McClurkin and Marinus Jensen Nygaard. The son of a Danish immigrant, he studied to be a concert violinist at the Juilliard School of Music and the Kings Conservatory in Copenhagen. He came to Dallas in search of a music degree from Southern Methodist University. While in school, he served in the Air National Guard where he broke his little finger sadly ending his violin career. He later attended the University of Texas Law School in Austin where he met his bride of 65 years, Shirley Walters. After marrying Shirley, they moved to Dallas where he worked for The Travelers Insurance Company, Mercantile National Bank, and eventually as an independent oil and gas operator and landman where he garnered most of his personal success. Max served as President of Dallas Civic Music and The Dallas Symphony Music Board. He was a sponsor for 500 Inc. and served on the Board for the Dallas Council on World Affairs. Max also enjoyed serving the City of University Park on the City Finance Committee and as Vice President of Southwest Higher Education Authority and President of Texas Higher Education Authority. On a personal level, his family and the Church of the Incarnation were of utmost importance to him. He played an active role being "Papa" to his grandsons. Max also loved gardening at his home. He enjoyed his memberships in the Society of the Cincinnatus, the Brotherhood of St. Andrew and The Military Order of the World Wars. Max is survived by his wife Shirley, his daughter and son-in-law, Alicia and Nace Formagus, Jr., his grandsons Lee William McNutt and Thomas Max Nygaard McNutt, as well as their families and six great-grandchildren.
